CARTONS CARLE!



Did you know that food and beverage cartons—milk, juice, soup, coconut water, etc.—can be recycled? It takes 30-45 days for a carton to go from "bin to box." In the end, they can be made into some really useful, everyday paper products.

WHEN THE CONTENTS ARE GONE,

LET THE CARTON LIVE ON!

Here's how:

AT HOME. Once the contents are gone, the consumer places their food or beverage carton in their recycling bin.

COLLECTION. A collection truck takes the cartons, along with other recyclables, to a local recycling facility for sorting and baling.















SORTING AND BALING.

Cartons are then sorted from other materials and separated, then baled for shipping to a mill.

PULPING. At one of nine paper mills in North America, paper fiber from the cartons is extracted and made into pulp by mixing the cartons with water in a machine called a "hydrapulper."

RECYCLING. Pulp is then used to make new products (paper towels, tissue paper and other paper products, as well as green building materials like ceiling tiles and backerboard).
